Daniel Burns, NE ½ 2-8-19 WPM, appeared in opposition to the application. He indicated he did not believe the proposed location was a fit with the surrounding area and did not meet the three test requirements set out in The Planning Act, the Development Plan and the Zoning By-law. He noted the surrounding area was large holdings for agricultural purposes. Redesignation of the area would be likely to result in conflicts between existing agricultural operations and new residential parcels. A copy of his presentation was being sent to the office to be placed on file.

Murray Kozak, S ½ 2-8-19 WPM, appeared in opposition to the application as he has a cattle operation with between 75 to 100 animals and has concerns with respect to water supply and the potential for conflict with a residential development.

Jason Flikweert, owner of 2 & 10 Metal Recycling in SE ½ 2-8-19 WPM, appeared before Council appeared in opposition to the application with respect to the density being proposed.





8 in 10 Manitobans support PST rebates to municipalities

April 10, 2022 - The Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) recently commissioned a Probe Research poll asking whether the provincial government should provide PST rebates to Manitoba municipalities.

Out of 1,000 respondents, **78 per cent** indicated that they strongly agree or somewhat agree that the provincial government should return provincial sales tax (PST) payments to local governments.

"Manitoba municipalities pay PST and federal goods and services tax (GST), however the federal government rebates the GST while the provincial government does not return the approximate \$25 million paid annually in PST," explained AMM President Kam Blight. "These funds could be immediately reinvested in local communities to address our growing infrastructure deficit and help spur a quicker economic recovery from the pandemic."

The AMM has long called for a PST rebate since one order of government should not tax another. "Clearly, the vast majority of Manitobans support our call since there is only one taxpayer and tax dollars should be used efficiently to advance growth projects. PST funds should remain in local communities where they are needed the most," added President Blight.

As the provincial budget will be unveiled on April 12th, the AMM will be looking for movement on rebating the PST to municipalities as one option to lift the six-year freeze on municipal operating funding as well as the provision of additional supports to help offset the estimated \$91.8 million operating loss experienced in 2021 by municipalities due to the pandemic. AMM President Kam Blight will be at the Manitoba Legislature on Budget Day to provide comments.

Provincial Budget Boosts Communities Fund, Key Issues Remain Unresolved

April 13, 2022 – Budget 2022 includes several changes to funding and select programs that are of interest to Manitoba municipalities, including:

- A higher ceiling for the Building Sustainable Communities Fund (from \$10M to \$25M);
- \$9M in dedicated funding for the Green Teams program (from \$5M to \$9M);
- Increased support for the Manitoba Water Services Board (from \$15.8M to \$20M);
- Resolution of a payments-in-lieu of tax issue raised repeatedly by AMM members;
- \$7.2B for health care, the most significant health care investment in the province to date; and
- Over \$2.4B in strategic infrastructure investments between 2022 and 2024.

While the Building Sustainable Communities program is open to other applicants, not just Manitoba municipalities, municipal leaders confirm that the program is popular across Manitoba, and the \$25M fund will help promote sustainability and resilience in local communities.

The Province also announced an agreement with the federal government to address transit operating shortfalls – a commitment that will be critical to several municipalities.

However, the AMM noted that critical issues raised with the Province to help spur a quicker economic recovery from the pandemic remain outstanding, namely the inconsistent treatment of municipalities on provincial sales taxes and ongoing municipal operating funding freeze - which will now be extended into its seventh year.

"Key issues central to the success and sustainability of Manitoba's municipalities remain unresolved," stated AMM President Kam Blight. "We are ready for continued dialogue with provincial officials to find solutions to unresolved issues facing our member municipalities."

Service and Life Membership Pins

SERVICE PIN CRITERIA

- Years of service need not be consecutive. For the purpose of calculating service time, the total number of years served by a member of council, whether consecutive years or in two or more times served on council will be considered.
- Service need not be with the same municipality. For the purpose of calculating service time, the total number of
 years served by a member of council, whether with one or more municipalities within Manitoba will be
 considered.
- In the event a member of council fails to receive a service pin during the year that he/she reaches any service pin milestone, he/she may request the pin in a future year and will be awarded the respective pin either at the next district meeting or at any time as agreed to by the Executive Committee.
- Years of service are recognized once 5 years have been completed and are then recognized every 5 years following until year 40. An individual elected in October 2018 would have been eligible for a 5-year pin in 2023.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP AWARD CRITERIA

All nominees must be endorsed by the council of an AMM member municipality or by the Board of Directors of the AMM.

Dear Manitoba Municipalities:

On March 14, 2022, the Honourable Jeff Wharton, Minister of Environment, Climate and Parks, introduced Bill 22. Bill 22 amends The Environment Act (the act) to allow Manitobans to use federally approved cosmetic pesticides on their lawns. At the same time, it enhances protection for children and pets.

The Manitoba government is committed to protecting human health and the environment. It is also committed to science-based decision-making. Proposed changes to cosmetic pesticides legislation respond to what we heard from Manitobans, including in a survey conducted in 2016. An overview of the survey can be found here. We heard the current legislation is not working because products are ineffective.

Proposed changes to the act and Non-Essential Pesticide Use Regulation would:

- Improve flexibility for households to choose products for their lawns that have already been approved through Health Canada's rigorous review process.
- Out of an abundance of caution, continue to protect children and pets by restricting
 pesticide use at schools, child care centres, and hospitals. The Bill also adds new
 restrictions on municipal playgrounds, picnic areas, dog parks, and provincial parks.
- Allow for the use of Health Canada approved cosmetic pesticides in low-risk areas such as municipal boulevards, sidewalks, right-of-ways, and fairgrounds.

All pesticides used in Manitoba must be approved by <u>Health Canada</u>. Cosmetic pesticides currently restricted in Manitoba are deemed acceptable by Health Canada.

Health Canada thoroughly reviews pesticides and deems them safe when used according to the label. Over 350 Health Canada scientists are dedicated to the review of pesticides. They use the most recent data and science available to assess risks to human health and the environment. Any pesticide must go through this review before it can be sold in Canada.

If the Bill becomes legislation, pesticide use permits will still be required for municipalities, government departments, crown corporations, and owners of private property to which the public has access to for recreation, including for the use of cosmetic pesticides. Permits are available through the department. Although Bill 22 specifically restricts the use of cosmetic pesticides in municipal playgrounds, picnic areas, and dog parks, it does not define those areas. Instead, those areas will be defined in Pesticide Use Permits.

To inform the definitions, the department is seeking your input to ensure we understand the implications at a municipal level. The objective is to enhance protections for children and pets while making sure Pesticide Use Permits are clear and practical.

Some initial engagement has already occurred. Environment, Climate and Parks has met with the Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM), the City of Winnipeg, and the Manitoba Weed Supervisors Association (MWSA) representatives. In April, the department also presented these changes at the AMM Spring Convention and the MWSA Business Meeting.

During these initial meetings and presentations, we heard municipalities appreciate the improved flexibility for communities to have pleasing and usable greenspace. We also heard you would like clarity on where cosmetic pesticide use is allowed and not allowed.

We have incorporated what we heard in the following draft definitions and would like your input. We welcome your review and comment.

"Playground" means an area with a play structure or equipment, including, but not limited to, swing sets, slides, and teeter-totters, and includes the area within 15 meters around those play structures or equipment. A playground does not include a field or turf used for recreation or sporting events.

"Picnic area" means an area where one or more tables are located for the public to consume food and drink, and the area within 15 meters around those tables.

"Dog park" means an area designated by the local authority and identified by signage for dogs to exercise and play under the supervision of their owners.

Please provide your comments on the above definitions or any other input regarding changes to the way cosmetic pesticides are regulated in Manitoba to PesticideUsePermit@gov.mb.ca by May 30, 2022. We will use your feedback to revisit the definitions and adjust as needed. At that time, we may reach out for further discussion.

Greetings and thank you for taking the time to read this email. My business partner and I are marketing and developing Waste-to-Energy Systems for landfill diversion of existing waste quantities and can process legacy waste in existing landfills as well (landfill mining), using them to produce energy and other products that can provide significant economic benefits. As our planet and our society face mounting challenges for the future, we are developing these systems to do three things to help the planet: 1) Divert waste to reduce and eliminate landfills and the associated issues and liabilities surrounding them; 2) Provide a significant economic benefit through the production of energy and other products, and; 3) Provide a significant reduction of Greenhouse gases.



On February 6, 2022, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II marked the 70th anniversary of Her accession to the Throne as Queen of Canada, an unprecedented historic occasion. In celebration of this event, a commemorative medal has been created by the Government of Manitoba. The Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee Medal (Manitoba) is a visible and tangible way to recognize 1,000 outstanding Manitobans of all ages and from all walks of life, who have built and continue to build a caring society and province through their service, contributions, and achievements. To ensure that every field of activity is recognized, Trusted Partners are invited to select recipients from their community or organization for this honour. The list of partnering organizations will soon be available on the Manitoba Protocol Office's departmental website. This medal program is one element of the Province's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. The Protocol Office (part of the Department of Sport, Culture and Heritage), in partnership with the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, administers the program.

To be eligible for this honour, a person:

- Must be a resident of Manitoba or have a tangible link to Manitoba, at the time the medal is granted;
- Must have made a significant contribution to Canada, Manitoba or a particular Manitoban region or community;




